ARRIVAL TO BELGRADE

Belgrade Airport

When you arrive, please be aware that the best way of transportation to downtown is a taxi. It is recommended to go to the taxi desk (close to the Exit on Arrival Terminal) which will hand you over a ticket depending on your accommodation destination. For the suggested hotels the price is around 3.000 Serbian dinars (approx. 25€). Please have Serbian dinars with you as many taxis don't accept credit cards or euros.

Optionally, you can download the [Cargo application](#), and try to order a vehicle through the app. Prices should be similar or lower in comparison to the taxi.

As for the buses, more information can be found [here](#). The airport is under long-lasting construction so you need to ask about the spot where exactly these buses stop.

Money

The Serbian currency is dinar. One euro currently equals around 120 Serbian dinars (RSD), while 1,000 dinars currently equals around 8,5€. There is a money exchange machine at the airport next to the exit doors of the arrival terminal and the taxi desk. You can pay by card in most places in Belgrade, but you should have at least some dinars with you.

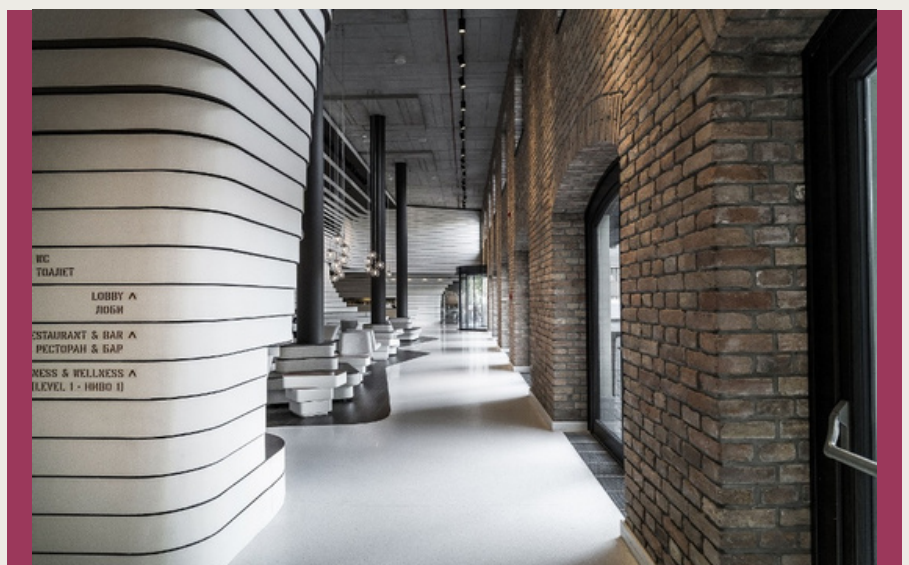

THINGS TO DO IN BELGRADE

Explore the park Kalemegdan and Belgrade fortress

When you come to Belgrade, this is the first place to visit. Built in 279 BC, Kalemegdan, or Belgrade Fortress, is located in one of the best parks in the famous white city. Kalemegdan is located in the city centre, it's open 24/7, and it's free.

During the summer days, you can enjoy free music and even dance lessons. Here you will find the most famous statue in this part of Europe and its history might shock you.

The entire park lies on top of underground tunnels, built by Romans, Hungarians, Serbs, Ottomans, Austrians and others, centuries ago. You can actually visit these tunnels and even have a glass of wine, with expert tour guides. Working hours are Tuesday – Sunday 11:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m. (summer working hours) and 10.00 - 17.00 (winter opening hours).

Meet the famous Pobednik (The Victor) monument



This is one of the most loved places in Belgrade. Standing next to Pobednik, you will be able to soak in the most amazing view in the city, watching the two rivers creating a confluence. Initially, a century ago, the monument was supposed to be in a different spot, but since it's naked with only holding a sword and a dove in his hand, ladies were so shocked that the city's officials decided to move it to Kalemegdan, away from the city centre.

Nikola Tesla Museum and Nikola Tesla monument

The museum corpus consists of nine collections. Within this corpus, more than 1200 items were officially registered. Among these collections original technical objects in the field of mechanical and electrical engineering are preserved, as well as personal items and Nikola Tesla's clothing, his medals and decorations and the artifacts of fine and applied art from his legacy.

National Museum

The National Museum is located in the center of Belgrade – it is on the main city square called Trg Republike / Republic Square. The permanent collection represents a huge chronological period from the Paleolithic period to the 20th century art.

Museum of Contemporary Arts

Since its foundation in 1965, the Museum of Contemporary Arts has based its display policy and the collections on the superb representation of the most relevant artists, periods, movements and tendencies in Yugoslav, Serbian and international art of the 20th century.

Museum of Science and Technology

The Museum of Science and Technology in Belgrade collects, researches, protects and presents to the public scientific and technical cultural goods, with the aim of raising scientific and technical culture, popularising science and modern scientific achievements.

Pay a visit to bohemian Skadarlija

Stroll down the last bohemian quarter in Belgrade! Skadarlija is located in the city centre and it's filled with traditional restaurants, music and good old spirit. Here, with the first drink, you will learn to say cheers in Serbian: živelj!

Take a tram ride- Line number 2 - Krug dvojke



The tram system was introduced in Belgrade in 1891. Line #2 is the most famous and one of the oldest as it circles around the city's heart. Take this tram to explore Belgrade's main landmarks and spots. One circle takes around 60 minutes, with a possible tour in English ([check it here](#)).

Pay a visit to Saint Sava Temple

The Saint Sava Temple is the largest Serbian Orthodox church in the world, and it's seen as a religious heart of Belgrade. The initial design was conceived in the late 19th century, with the construction only begun in 1935, and it's yet to be finished. The crypt located seven meters below the ground is also open for visits with its unique guided dome mosaic.

Ružica church / Little rose church

19th century Ružica church is one of the oldest existing churches of Belgrade (as all early Christian, Byzantine and medieval churches were destroyed during the Ottomans rule and subsequent wars). It's tucked into the north-eastern walls of the Kalemegdan Fortress, under the Zindan gate. If you visit this small chapel on Sunday and during spring/autumn, you will definitely see newlyweds heading toward the church. Feel free to wave at them, or say how beautiful they are – they will love it!

Avala mountain

Only 20 kilometers from the city center, we have a picnic area and protected area of Avala, which provides its citizens with pristine nature, clean air and all kinds of recreation, from running, walking, hiking, sports activities to sightseeing.

Zemun- Gardoš, kula Sibanjin Janka

Even today, Zemun is said to be a city within a city. The symbol of the city is the Millennium Tower on Gardoš hill, located in the central part of the oldest preserved fortification from the 14th century. The tower, popularly known as Sibanjin Janka Tower, is open to visitors every day. The most attractive part of the tower is the observation deck, where you can observe the surrounding panorama through a telescope during clear winter days.

Stari Zemun, in its narrow streets, next to the old buildings from the time of Austro-Hungarian domination, attracts many visitors with its traditional hospitality, national cuisine and intimate atmosphere of its restaurants. We recommend a daily walk along the always full Zemun quay, along the banks of the Danube, where you can relax, try fish specialties and have fun listening to old town music.

The Royal and White Palaces

The Royal and White Palaces on Belgrade's Dedinje Hill bear witness to the rise of Serbia that was tragically cut short by the Second World War. As part of the palace complex, there is also a palace chapel dedicated to St. Apostle Andrew the First-Called. Pergolas, park terraces, swimming pools, a pavilion and a concert terrace were built around the palace buildings.

Today, visitors during a two-hour tour of the Palace complex, accompanied by professional tour guides, passing through the halls of the Royal and White Palace, furnished in the style of Louis XV and Louis XVI with Venetian chandeliers and works of art by world masters of painting, can feel the lifestyle and atmosphere of the residential complex of the Karađorđević dynasty.
